I received a newspaper clipping and read with interest the successful adjudication of the Maryland teacher's salary case. Congratulations to you and Ransom for doing a great job.

By now, you have probably had reports of the outcome of the New Orleans branch election. I am enclosing a hand bill, which represents the losing slate. These fellows started to out to get Brazier's scalp, but a split occurred and the old line "big shote" refused to be excluded from sharing the honors, so they put up a man and won the election. Brazier was an "also ran", he polled seven (7) votes. This group, however, is soley responsible for over 300 additional new N.A.A.C.P. members.

The present administration is on the spot in as much as we intend to force them to do their job. I am afraid that we shall still have trouble with these Negroes concerning employment of Negro lawyers. You know all about that and why.
